Sprattle Beam

The sprattle beam (beam in the middle of the cap) has been fabricated by Awerkamp Machine of Quincy. Greg Frese has painted the new beam to match the existing beams. The new beam will be installed in the Spring 2010.

New Cooler for Kitchen

A new cooler in on order to replace the “less than energy efficient” existing cooler. We should see a significant change in electrical use. (hopefully)

Windows

One of the windows in the hallway between the museum and hall has been replaced. The seal had broken and the window was foggy.

Gutters

New gutters were installed on the banquet hall.

Electrical/Culverts

DO YOU KNOW why the Emminga Bank Building was not built square?


It has been brought to our attention that the Emminga Bank building is not square.

TYPES OF WINDMILLS



Post mills, top heavy unit with sails that revolved around a single post at its base.

Tower windmills are familiar to anyone visiting Holland. They consist of a large tower constructed of wood, brick or stone and

topped by a timber or thatched roof. Only the cap with the sails revolved.

The “**Smock**” mill was named according to tradition because it resembled a person wearing a smock. An alternative to the tower mill, it was usually framed

in wood and covered with boards in an octagonal design which gave the appearance of a giant figure wearing a smock or dress. Our Prairie Mill windmill is a “smock” mill.



LETTER TRANSLATION by Andreas Altemueller

To
Harm H. Emminga Wisemer Mill
P.O. Aurich Province Hannover
Kingdom of PrussiaEurope
Koekuck Junction, May 30th 1869

Dear cousin and relatives,

One more time I am trying to write to you and to convey how we are doing here. We are all well and healthy. The weather is once again relatively nice today after having a lot of terrible thunder storms lately. In the last several days, all of our windows were damaged twice, some roofs of houses and stables were ripped off and displaced. The house of Gerd Post was dislocated by the storm and destroyed completely, except for one window. Only a few parts could be salvaged. It was a block-house. One of the beams flew more than a mile into a nearby meadow. The staircase and bathroom (toilette?) were ripped out through the

roof and were dislocated by about 75 steps. Everybody was at home at the time, but nobody suffered any injuries. We also had stored grain in bins, covered with planks at "Poppe Huels", that were broken and scattered by about 600 steps from "Ibes". The entire storm was nothing but swirls which one could see even from far away going into all directions. There was a load roar. The day before we had heavy hail and many streets and fields were rendered very wet or flooded.

Most of the grain has been planted and many others (farmers) are done, but we are not done. We still have 7 acres to plow and plant. The first planting almost always does not do so well, since it is still somewhat cold for wheat, the same goes for barley. Oats are doing well, rye was bad, winter wheat was even worse. We don't have either.

The letter which you had attached to uncle Jann Franzen's letter, was lost. Jann Jochen and Walter went to the post office immediately. Walter received the letter and put it into his pocket together with some newspapers. He most certainly

lost it when he pulled these things out of his pocket. I was upset, since you certainly worked diligently on it - as always. But we read uncle Jann's letter and also the greetings intended for me. We also saw the note inside of the envelope - as always. This is as good as a letter from you. You are writing: you want to send the books by mail if they are not too heavy. This is alright with me. You are also writing about the hand-organ (editor: recorder) to be send with U. Albers' mother in law and the rest of the things. This is ok, since a year more or less will not matter. Granddad is getting weaker and weaker. Uncle Jann Flesner's wife, which is my aunt Rita Flesner, died about three weeks ago. She had Pneumonia. Also, Tonsman's wife died of the same disease. And Karl Tenhaeff's wife and the old grandpa Garrelt died, too. Nicklaus' father in law.

I don't have anything else to write for this time.
